

# Activism Trends in the United Kingdom: An Analytical Assessment for 2026

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# Introduction

The year 2025 witnessed a significant expansion in activism and protest activity across the United Kingdom, characterised by sustained mobilisation across multiple ideological spectrums and unprecedented levels of direct action. Environmental activists achieved notable policy victories with Just Stop Oil securing governmental commitments on fossil fuel licensing before disbanding in April 2025.

Pro-Palestine activism maintained considerable momentum throughout the year, with quarterly national demonstrations attracting thousands of participants to London and targeted direct-action campaigns resulting in corporate divestment from Israeli defence companies. The landscape was further complicated by escalating tensions surrounding migration policy, which manifested in both anti-asylum seeker demonstrations and substantial counter-protest activity. The protest calendar extended well beyond the traditional spring to summer window, with organised activity continuing through to late December, indicating a fundamental shift in activist behaviour patterns.

## Introduction - Looking ahead to 2026

Looking ahead to 2026, it is almost certain the activism landscape will remain highly active across diverse causes. The convergence of these diverse movements creates a complex operational environment throughout 2026.

1. The emergence of Take Back Power, signals a strategic pivot from environmental issues towards economic inequality whilst maintaining disruptive direct-action methodologies.
2. Pro-Palestine activism will almost certainly continue with sustained intensity given the ongoing fragility of ceasefire arrangements in Gaza.
3. Right-wing anti-migration activism is anticipated to remain prominent, with established groups including Britain First and emerging networks such as Pink Ladies organising regular demonstrations.
4. Anti-fascist and anti-racist movements are mobilising substantial coalition efforts, exemplified by the Together alliance which aims to marshal significant numbers in opposition to far-right narratives.
5. Scottish independence activism will likely intensify ahead of the May 2026 elections.
6. Geopolitical developments concerning Iran, Ukraine and Venezuela are expected to generate solidarity protests.



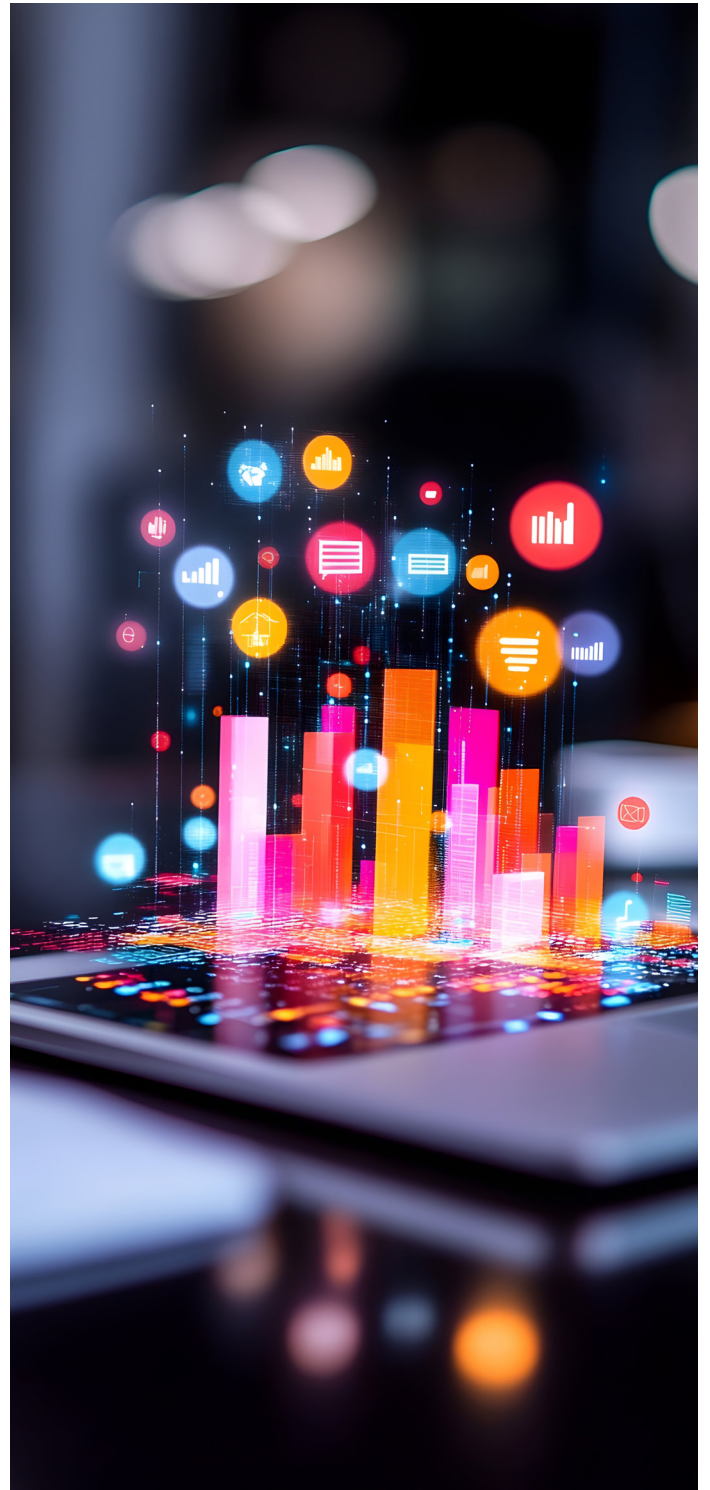
# Environmental Activism & Economic Justice

Environmental activism underwent a significant transformation during the latter half of 2025, with activity levels declining compared to the intense campaigns of previous years. This reduction can be partially attributed to Just Stop Oil achieving its stated objective regarding new fossil fuel licensing, which prompted the organisation's decision to cease operations in April 2025. However, the apparent quietening of climate activism also reflects the overshadowing effect of sustained pro-Palestine mobilisation, which dominated public attention and activist energy throughout much of the year.

Analysis suggests considerable overlap exists between environmental and pro-Palestine activist demographics, with individuals holding compatible worldviews across both causes. This confluence has resulted in some activists redirecting their efforts towards Palestinian solidarity whilst others have transitioned into new organisational formations addressing broader systemic concerns.

Following Elon Musk's acquisition of Twitter in 2022, now known as X, there has been a growing trend of environmental activists leaving the social media platform. Many organisations have assessed that the platform's transformation has resulted in algorithmic prioritisation of contrarian and far-right content, creating an environment hostile to factual climate communication and effective mobilisation. Consequently, environmental activist networks have migrated to alternative platforms, predominantly Instagram and BlueSky for public engagement, whilst utilising encrypted messaging applications such as Signal for organisational coordination and operational planning. This migration presents notable implications for intelligence gathering and monitoring capabilities. Traditional social media monitoring tools demonstrate limited functionality for Instagram's platform architecture and possess no capability to access encrypted private group communications on Signal.

It is therefore likely that visibility into environmental activist planning processes and open-source intelligence collection methodologies that have previously been effective are likely to yield diminished returns throughout 2026.



# Insure Our Survival

Insure Our Survival represents a particularly significant environmental activist organisation, warranting close monitoring throughout 2026. The group employs a strategic focus on insurance sector engagement with fossil fuel projects, positioning insurance provision as a critical leverage point within the broader fossil fuel economy.

Insure our Survival is likely to maintain the same approach in 2026 as they did the previous year, conducting week-long intensive campaigns against individual insurance companies. This methodology enables concentration of activist resources and media attention on specific firms, maximising pressure and reputational impact whilst maintaining sustained campaign tempo throughout the year. The group has announced their opening campaign will target Zurich Insurance with a week-long boycott initiative commencing in early January 2026.

Following the perceived success of their global week of action in September 2025, Insure Our Survival is highly likely to organise a comparable coordinated campaign in 2026. This format involves simultaneous targeting of multiple insurance companies throughout a designated week, which will likely include protests, demonstrations, leafleting and vigils conducted outside corporate offices.

The group has also conducted targeted actions against chief executives of insurance firms. These tactics have included deployment of mobile advertising screens displaying images and messaging regarding specific executives, driven through London financial districts and past corporate headquarters. This approach seeks to generate reputational damage to individual leaders, potentially influencing corporate decision-making through personal rather than purely institutional pressure.

The organisation's strategic focus, demonstrated campaign effectiveness and sophisticated tactical approach collectively suggest it is highly likely it will remain a prominent actor within environmental activism throughout 2026, particularly affecting organisations within the insurance and financial sectors that the group perceive as supporting fossil fuel infrastructure development.



# Take Back Power

The emergence of Take Back Power is likely to represent the most significant development in this activist sphere for 2026. This rebranding emerged in December 2025, when Just Stop Oil announced that it was transforming into Take Back Power, with the new campaign demanding the establishment of a legally binding citizens' assembly to address economic inequality. The organisation retains core personnel and methodologies from Just Stop Oil. The group has pledged to mobilise hundreds of activists to target the luxury lifestyles of the super-rich, representing a deliberate strategic shift from environmental concerns towards wealth redistribution and economic justice themes.

Take Back Power's tactical approach mirrors the escalatory model successfully employed by Just Stop Oil, utilising nonviolent civil resistance to generate media attention and apply pressure for policy change. The organisation conducted its inaugural action in December 2025 when activists threw apple crumble at the display case containing the Imperial State Crown at the Tower of London, symbolising their assertion that democracy has crumbled. This action established the group's willingness to target high-profile cultural sites to amplify their message.

The group has announced its first major mobilisation for 17 January 2026 in Limehouse, London, which is anticipated to feature speeches, ideological presentations and substantial supporter attendance drawn from former Just Stop Oil participants who have remained largely inactive since April 2025.

Throughout 2026, Take Back Power is highly likely to conduct increasingly disruptive actions until their demands receive governmental response. Historical precedent from Just Stop Oil suggests the organisation will employ an escalatory trajectory, beginning with symbolic actions before progressing to more impactful disruption should initial demands go unmet. Potential targets include government buildings and assets, reflecting dissatisfaction with political leadership, as well as corporations perceived as insufficiently contributing to the United Kingdom tax base. The intersection of economic inequality messaging with lingering environmental concerns may also see the group targeting businesses with both significant wealth concentration and fossil fuel industry connections. Security professionals should anticipate actions designed for maximum visibility and media coverage, potentially involving physical occupation, property damage or disruption to high-profile events and locations. The group's stated focus on wealth inequality rather than exclusively environmental issues may broaden their appeal and recruitment base, potentially drawing support from labour movement and social justice networks beyond traditional climate activism circles.

# Pro-Palestine Activism

Pro-Palestine activism will almost certainly maintain substantial intensity throughout 2026, driven by the ongoing fragility of ceasefire arrangements in Gaza and continued British governmental and corporate engagement with Israel. The ceasefire brokered through American mediation remains precarious, with President Trump expressing optimism regarding Phase 2 of his peace plan whilst acknowledging significant obstacles to sustainable resolution. The persistence of conflict, humanitarian crisis and international debate regarding Israeli military operations provides sustained impetus for activist mobilisation within the UK. Established organisations including Palestine Solidarity Campaign, Stop the War Coalition and Youth Front for Palestine possess robust infrastructure, experienced leadership and demonstrated capacity for large-scale mobilisation that will almost certainly continue throughout the coming year. Quarterly national demonstrations in London have become established features of the activism calendar, regularly attracting thousands of participants and generating significant public attention. These events will likely continue in 2026, with particular intensity anticipated around anniversary dates and commemorative occasions.

Direct action targeting businesses perceived as complicit in the Israel-Gaza conflict represents a parallel and increasingly significant dimension of pro-Palestine activism. The announced divestment by insurance companies Allianz and Axa from Israeli defence manufacturer Elbit Systems following sustained activist pressure represents a substantial strategic victory for pro-Palestine groups. This success is likely to embolden further campaigns targeting financial institutions, weapons manufacturers, drone producers and other corporations with Israeli defence sector connections.



# Palestine Action

The proscription of Palestine Action as a terrorist organisation, in July 2025, has fundamentally altered the operational landscape for activism. The British government proscribed Palestine Action following a security breach at RAF Brize Norton where activists vandalised a RAF aircraft. This decision generated substantial controversy, with civil liberties organisations, UN human rights experts and numerous legal professionals criticising the application of terrorism legislation to property damage protests. The proscription is currently subject to judicial review, with court proceedings ongoing.

A legal challenge has been launched in the Scottish courts by former diplomat Craig Murray, who argues that the ban is “absurdly authoritarian” and violates the European Convention on Human Rights (ECHR), specifically Articles 10 and 11. Advocates suggest that a successful ruling in Scotland could create a “constitutional crisis” by making the proscription unlawful in Scotland while it remains in effect in England and Wales.

Meanwhile, the primary legal appeal in London remains in a critical phase. The High Court substantive hearing for the judicial review concluded its three-day sitting on 2nd December 2025. The court is currently considering its judgment and whilst no specific date for the verdict has been finalised, legal experts anticipate a ruling early this year. If the High Court upholds the proscription, the case is almost certain to be escalated to the Court of Appeal and potentially the Supreme Court, ensuring that the legal status of the organisation remains a central point of contention throughout 2026 as well as protests associated with it. The case has already resulted in over two thousand arrests, predominantly for individuals holding signs expressing support for Palestine Action or opposing the proscription itself. The long-term implications of this proscription remain uncertain, but it has demonstrably created a chilling effect on certain forms of direct action, whilst simultaneously generating solidarity protests and potentially radicalising some activists who view the proscription as state overreach.

# Right-Wing and Anti-Migration Activism

Right-wing activism, particularly that focused on migration and asylum policy, will almost certainly remain prominent throughout 2026. The coming together of established organisations, emerging grassroots networks and influential individuals has created a substantial mobilisation capacity capable of attracting thousands to demonstrations across the United Kingdom.

Groups such as Britain First, alongside individuals including Tommy Robinson and UKIP leader, Nick Tenconi, have consistently demonstrated the ability to marshal significant supporter numbers around anti-migration, anti-Muslim and nationalist themes. The rhetoric employed by these actors frequently crosses into explicitly racist and Islamophobic territory, creating environments conducive to tension and occasional violence.

Britain First has announced its first event of 2026 will occur in Manchester on 21 February, continuing their established theme of marches for remigration. The organisation has expressed ambitions for this demonstration to exceed previous attendance figures,

with claimed expectations of 100,000 participants. Whilst such projections often exceed actual turnout, the event will almost certainly attract substantial numbers and generate significant counter-mobilisation from anti-fascist groups. The remigration concept, which advocates for the deportation or repatriation of immigrants and their descendants, represents an increasingly explicit articulation of white nationalist ideology within British right-wing activism.

This event and similar gatherings throughout the year will require substantial policing resources and there is a realistic possibility that some events will result in public disorder, particularly where counter-demonstrations occur in proximity.

## Asylum seeker Hotel Protest

Asylum seeker accommodation sites have emerged as persistent flashpoints for protest activity. Demonstrations targeting hotels housing asylum seekers peaked during summer 2025 but are highly likely to continue throughout 2026. These protests typically manifest in two forms: organised large-scale demonstrations bringing together participants from wide geographic areas, and smaller localised protests by residents near accommodation facilities.

The former category is likely to include coordinated actions in London targeting Parliament to pressure governmental policy changes, whilst the latter involves ongoing vigils and demonstrations outside specific hotels. The spontaneous nature of some local protests, often triggered by media coverage of incidents involving asylum seekers or migrants, creates unpredictability in

timing and location. These events are likely to generate volatile situations given the vulnerable nature of asylum seeker populations and the inflammatory rhetoric often employed by protesters.

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# Pink Ladies

The Pink Ladies represent a particularly significant development within the anti-migration activist landscape. This network has established regional cells across most counties in England, creating distributed mobilisation capacity that can respond rapidly to emerging issues or opportunities for protest. The group frames their activism around protecting women and children, leveraging legitimate concerns about safety to advance anti-migration and anti-Muslim agendas. This framing strategy has proven effective in attracting participants who might not engage with explicitly far-right organisations, thereby broadening the movement's appeal beyond traditional nationalist circles.

Pink Ladies demonstrate sophisticated use of social media for coordination and rapid mobilisation, enabling them to organise protests around breaking news stories with minimal lead time. It is almost certain that this network and grassroots campaigns like it will have continued activity throughout 2026, particularly in response to media coverage of crimes or incidents involving migrants or asylum seekers, which groups will exploit to advance their narrative and mobilise demonstrations.

# No to Digital ID's

Opposition to digital identification schemes represents an emerging protest theme that gained traction in late 2025 which is likely to continue throughout 2026. Prime Minister Keir Starmer's announcement in September 2025 regarding a United Kingdom digital identification scheme, primarily aimed at addressing illegal working through smartphone-based right-to-work verification, has generated substantial opposition framed around privacy and civil liberties concerns. Protests in 2025 were organised in major towns and cities, with specific events already scheduled for this year in Truro (10 January), Birmingham and Glasgow (24 January) and London (7 February).

These demonstrations are likely to attract hundreds if not thousands of participants, drawing from libertarian, privacy advocacy and anti-establishment constituencies. The digital identification issue provides a potential point of convergence for diverse opposition groups, from civil liberties advocates to conspiracy-oriented activists concerned about governmental surveillance and control.



# Anti-Fascist and Anti-Racist Mobilisation

Anti-fascist and anti-racist activism will almost certainly maintain high levels of activity throughout 2026, functioning primarily in reactive capacity to right-wing demonstrations whilst also pursuing proactive coalition-building and public education initiatives. Organisations such as Stand Up to Racism have established sophisticated monitoring and rapid response capabilities, enabling them to organise counter-demonstrations wherever far-right groups announce protests. This reactive model has proven effective in regularly outnumbering right-wing protesters and contesting their presence in public space. Counter-demonstrations typically feature placards with slogans such as “Refugees Welcome” and “Oppose Fascism”, creating visual and numerical opposition to anti-migration messaging. These events frequently occur in close proximity to the demonstrations they oppose, creating complex public order situations requiring careful police management to prevent violent confrontation.

Beyond large-scale mobilisations, anti-fascist groups will continue employing established tactics of monitoring far-right activity, exposing individuals involved in racist organising and providing physical presence at locations targeted by right-wing protesters. This work often involves

confrontational elements, as anti-fascist activists seek to deny far-right groups unchallenged access to public space. It is highly likely that there will be continued tensions at locations where right-wing and anti-fascist activists come into proximity, with potential for violence despite stated commitments to nonviolence by many anti-racist organisations.

The ideological intensity surrounding debates over migration, national identity and racial justice creates environments where de-escalation proves difficult and minor incidents have the ability to rapidly escalate. The sustained nature of both right-wing and anti-fascist mobilisation throughout 2025 suggests it is highly likely these tensions will persist throughout 2026, requiring ongoing vigilance and responsive planning from security professionals managing sites or events that may become focal points for protest activity.



# Together

The formation of the Together alliance represents the most significant development in anti-racist organising for 2026. This coalition comprises over eighty civil society organisations united against the far right, bringing together individuals, trade unions and aligned organisations to oppose racism and discrimination. The alliance has announced a national demonstration for 28th March in London, explicitly framed as a march against the far right. Trade unions have committed to mobilising their membership for this event, providing substantial organisational infrastructure and resources. The coalition benefits from celebrity endorsements and broad institutional support, factors that will almost certainly significantly enhance mobilisation capacity and public legitimacy.

On the 28th March demonstration is highly likely to attract thousands of participants from across the UK, likely representing one of the largest anti-racist mobilisations in recent years. The event will almost certainly proceed through central London, requiring extensive road closures and generating significant public transport disruption. This demonstration will highly likely be largely peaceful given the diverse coalition involved. However, the scale of the event and potential for counter-mobilisation from far-right groups creates scenarios requiring comprehensive planning and substantial policing resources.

# Scottish Independence Activism

Scottish independence activism is anticipated to intensify throughout early 2026 ahead of elections scheduled for May, with multiple organisations planning demonstrations designed to maintain momentum for independence. The Scottish National Party, which has governed Scotland for over two decades, faces an uncertain electoral environment. Recent polling indicates decreased support compared to 2021 levels, whilst the Labour Party, despite forming the UK government, has also experienced declining popularity in Scotland. This volatility creates opportunities for all parties and uncertainty regarding final results. For independence activists, the election represents both opportunity and challenge: opportunity to pressure parties toward stronger independence commitments, and challenge in maintaining movement cohesion and public enthusiasm amid broader political uncertainties. Several organisations have announced demonstrations throughout the first half of 2026.

1. **Believe in Scotland** - Believe in Scotland has organised a rally and march on 28th March calling for Scottish independence, with over 2,400 individuals expressing interest in attending via social media. This timing, coinciding with the Together alliance's anti-racist demonstration in London, reflects the crowded protest calendar characterising 2026.

2. A Facebook group titled **United for Yes!** has created an event scheduled for 8th May, election results day, encouraging supporters to gather outside Holyrood to demonstrate support for an independent Scotland. This reactive mobilisation strategy, contingent on election outcomes, suggests activists are prepared to capitalise on results through immediate public demonstration, potentially building momentum for future campaigns regardless of specific electoral outcomes.

# All Under One Banner

All Under One Banner represents the most established independence demonstration organisation, conducting annual rallies in Edinburgh, Inverness, Stirling and Glasgow that consistently attract thousands of participants. Their events follow established formats, featuring marches through city centres with extensive displays of Scottish flags, speeches from independence advocates and carnival-like atmospheres that combine political messaging with cultural celebration. The timing of the Glasgow event, immediately preceding the election, positions it as both a final mobilisation effort before voting and a demonstration of movement strength, regardless of electoral outcomes. The subsequent events throughout the summer and early autumn maintain visibility and momentum, likely building toward renewed political campaigns should election results prove favourable or maintaining pressure should they prove disappointing from independence advocates' perspectives.

There exists a realistic possibility that additional demonstrations will be organised beyond these announced events, particularly in the period immediately preceding the May election. Independence activists have

demonstrated capacity for responsive mobilisation around political developments, and any significant campaign events, policy announcements or controversies are likely to generate protest activity.

It is highly likely that these demonstrations will be predominantly peaceful, reflecting the mainstream political nature of Scottish independence advocacy and the broad demographic participation these events attract. However, the scale of anticipated attendance at major events, particularly in Glasgow and Edinburgh, will require comprehensive public order planning including road closures, public transport coordination and management of potential counter-protests from unionist activists. The vocal nature of these demonstrations and extensive use of Scottish national symbolism creates highly visible public events that generate substantial media coverage and contribute to ongoing national debate regarding Scotland's constitutional future.



# Geopolitical Solidarity Protests

International developments will almost certainly generate protest activity within the United Kingdom throughout this year, with events in Iran, Ukraine, and Venezuela representing particularly significant drivers of solidarity demonstrations. The interconnected nature of contemporary activism, facilitated by social media and shared progressive worldviews across causes, ensures that international conflicts and humanitarian crises rapidly generate domestic protest responses.

These solidarity protests serve multiple functions: expressing moral opposition to perceived injustices, pressuring the British government to alter foreign policy positions and demonstrating internationalist solidarity with affected populations. For security professionals, these events create additional complexity in forecasting protest activity, as international developments are likely to trigger 'emergency demonstrations' with limited warning.

## Iran

Iran experienced significant internal unrest in late 2025, which has continued into January 2026, with protests on the Supreme leaders perceived lack of a lack of accountability or urgency regarding the country's cost of living crisis and the regime's strict social controls resulting in deaths and imprisonments of activists. The Iranian rial plummeted to a historic low of approximately 1.42 million per dollar by late December 2025. Inflation is estimated to remain above 40% throughout 2026. Young Iranians have demonstrated increasing willingness to challenge governmental authority despite severe repression, reflecting deep frustration with economic conditions and social restrictions. These internal Iranian protests will likely continue throughout 2026, and particularly severe crackdowns or high-profile activist deaths will almost certainly generate solidarity protests in the UK. Iranian diaspora communities, particularly in London, alongside human rights organisations have historically responded to Iranian governmental repression through demonstrations targeting Iranian diplomatic premises. It is highly likely that major human rights violations or escalatory government responses to protests will trigger substantial demonstrations outside the Iranian embassy in London, possibly involving civil disobedience such as blockades or occupation attempts.

## Ukraine

The ongoing war in Ukraine continues to generate activist engagement, with hope for early 2026 ceasefire providing both opportunity for celebration should peace emerge,

and continued protest should conflict persist. Ukrainian activists and sympathisers within the United Kingdom have consistently demonstrated outside Parliament and targeted businesses perceived as supporting Russian interests. The 22 February anniversary of the war's commencement represents a particularly significant date for substantial mobilisation. There exists high likelihood that thousands will gather in London for a large-scale demonstration marking this anniversary, marching through central London and demanding increased governmental support for Ukraine. Should the ceasefire negotiations fail, or conflict intensify, these protests may increase in frequency and size. Additionally, any exhibitions, performances or business activities involving Russian speakers or performers known to support President Putin will highly likely attract Ukrainian activist protests for the duration of such events. Security professionals managing venues or organisations with any Russian connections should anticipate potential protest activity and implement appropriate security measures.

## Venezuela

The United States military operation in Venezuela announced by President Trump on 03 January 2026 represents the most immediate international issue likely to generate protest activity in early 2026. Large-scale American military intervention in Latin America historically generates substantial opposition from British progressive activists, who view such actions as imperialist aggression. Solidarity protests will highly likely emerge in coming weeks across major towns and cities, with London, Edinburgh and Belfast anticipated to witness the largest demonstrations given the presence of American diplomatic facilities. The scale and nature of these protests will almost certainly be influenced by subsequent American actions in Venezuela. Prolonged military occupation, high civilian casualties or regime change operations would almost certainly generate large and more sustained protest activity. Additionally, there is a realistic possibility that American businesses, particularly those with defence or extractive industry connections, will become secondary targets for protest activity as activists seek to pressure American governmental policy through economic and reputational channels. The unpredictable nature of President Trump's foreign policy decision-making creates uncertainty regarding future developments that may generate protest responses, requiring ongoing monitoring of international affairs and assessment of potential domestic protest implications.

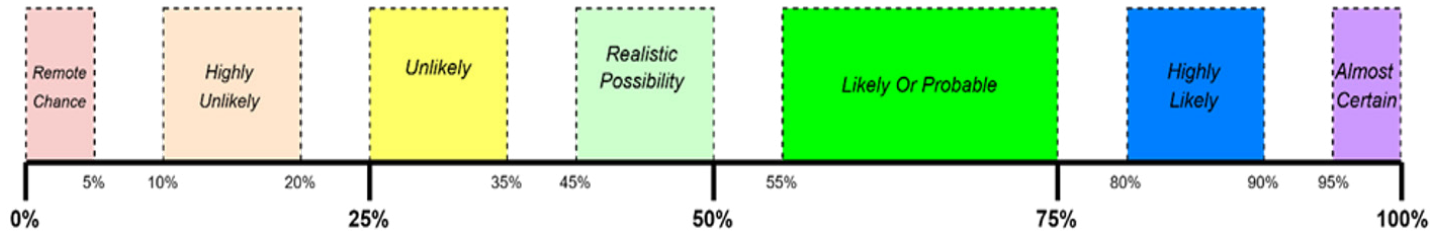

## PHIA Probability Yardstick

Below is the Professional Head of Intelligence Analysis (PHIA) yardstick. The PHIA probability Yardstick is the UK's standardised system for communicating the likelihood of events within intelligence assessments. It is designed to provide clarity and consistency in how intelligence analysts express uncertainty. It assigns verbal terms to define numerical ranges of probability which helps to avoid ambiguity in the interpretation of likelihood.
